




Calling in the Experts

- How often will you be in this kitchen?
- Has your kitchen become your home office?

These questions are important because it will form the foundation of the project as you work with your designer through the details. By setting your specific goals and mapping out a plan, your decisions will influence the overall design and budget.

Space planning!

Space is important no matter how large or small. Larger kitchens can lose function if not laid out properly and smaller kitchens need more attention to detail to utilize each square foot to the best advantage. The room size also plays a part in the overall budget. For instance, do you have room for a kitchen island or space for a pantry? Each of these factors play a role in the design and the layout of your kitchen.

Advantages of an existing layout

There are several benefits to working with your existing cabinetry layout, your budget may be a key role in just how much you are able to change. By not moving plumbing and electrical you can save money. Or you may want to allocate savings to other areas such as appliances, countertops and backsplash.

Infrastructure Issues

From a design perspective, this is our least favorite topic to address with clients. Load-bearing walls may limit what you can or cannot do from a design perspective. Older homes may need to have rough-in plumbing and electrical replaced to bring the home up to code, as well as leveling the floors. Infrastructure can lead to major roadblocks that can impact your budget. Your kitchen designer is able to understand and prepare you for these things early in the process. A good designer will be able to work with the recommendations of the contractor to determine what is best for your project.

Budget

Did you notice how many times we brought up the word budget? Establishing a budget with your kitchen designer from the beginning will be beneficial with the cabinet design and selection process. We want to steer you toward a product that is within your budget and we do this by using what we call a good, better, best selection process.

Starting the design process

Once you have determined the goals and the size of your kitchen renovation it is important to start working with a professional kitchen designer to develop a formal plan. A good kitchen designer will begin by reviewing what is important to you and begin by allocating allowances for each part of the project.

While you may be tempted to jump straight into picking out colors and finishes, a kitchen designer is first going to focus on your layout. Even though this part can be tedious it is a necessary step to move forward in the process. It's at this point where the amount of work is determined and how the budget will be spent.

Making selections

Then comes the part you have been waiting for, choosing the details such as cabinet finishes, hardware, flooring, lighting and other items related to the scope of your project. This is where we will focus on the aesthetic details and the “fun” part of the design.

Items related to the selection process you may not have thought about include:

- Cabinets: construction type, door style, finishes, and hardware.
- Countertops: granite, wood tops, marble, quartz or quartzite options.
- Appliances: refrigerators, ranges, cooktops, microwaves, dishwasher, and range hoods.
- Light fixtures: pendants, under cabinet lighting, and general lighting.
- Plumbing fixtures - sinks and faucets.
- Tile backsplash options.
- Flooring - tile, wood, or luxury vinyl tile.

Cabinets

Good

Good cabinetry is best defined as cabinets that fall between a stock cabinet and a semi-custom cabinet. A lower price point will reduce your selection choices in size and finish. These constraints will limit what the designer can do with your space and understand these cabinets will have restrictions with customizing options. A better cabinet is simply defined as having more options for creating a better design such as, cabinet sizes, door styles and finishes. These cabinets are usually referred to as a semi-custom or custom cabinetry. Some semi-custom lines do offer unlimited size increments. These cabinet lines will also offer more crown and light rail options as well as accessories such as roll-outs, utensil dividers, and blind corner units.
